**Insects, Hygiene and History**

Professor Busvine's research into the control of medically important arthropods (especially lice, fleas, bed bugs and itch mites) has yielded him a rich store of curious information which divides itself between the scientific and the literary or historical. An introductory account of the evolutionary histories of insects and mites leads on to a fascinating study of human reactions to ectoparasites, which shows how the extent of man's curiosity about them and hints of their prevalence provide a continuous commentary both on the history of biological science from Aristotle to the present day and on the modes and manners of past ages. Offering the writer convenient symbols of piety, love and human insignificance, they are subjects of ribald verse, quack medicine and morbid imagination, but only during the last century did it dawn on an incredulous medical faculty that these objects beneath contempt could transmit two of the most appalling epidemic diseases: plague and typhus.
